Honoring Our Heroes: POW/MIA Remembrance in the Department of Massachusetts American Legion Auxiliary

Each year, the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Massachusetts pauses to honor a solemn promise: "You Are Not Forgotten." That promise is made to America's Prisoners of War (POWs) and those Missing in Action (MIAs)—brave men and women who wore the uniform of the United States with honor, courage, and devotion to duty, yet have not returned home. Their service spans every conflict, from World War II to today's global missions. While their battles may have ended, the uncertainty for their families and loved ones has not. Massachusetts has a proud history of military service, stretching from the Minutemen at Lexington and Concord to the modern-day heroes deployed around the world. Our Commonwealth has always answered the call, and with that service comes the responsibility to remember those who remain unaccounted for. The POW/MIA Remembrance Ceremony is one way the Auxiliary fulfills that responsibility. Often symbolized by the Missing Man Table, the ceremony uses powerful visual symbols—a white tablecloth for purity of service, a red rose for sacrifice, lemon for the bitterness of fate, salt for the tears of waiting families, an inverted glass for absence, and an empty chair for the missing. Each item tells a part of the story of service, sacrifice, and hope. For the Auxiliary, remembrance is more than a yearly tradition—it is a continuing mission. Through advocacy, education, and community engagement, members keep the spotlight on the ongoing effort to bring every service member home and to support the families who still wait. From Boston Harbor to the hills of the Berkshires, Massachusetts will always keep faith with its heroes. Until the last POW and MIA is accounted for, the Department of Massachusetts American Legion Auxiliary will stand firm in its promise: You are not forgotten—and you never will be.

History of The American Legion Distinguished Service Medal: Tucked away on The American Legion national website, under the Information Center/Honor & Remembrance tabs you will find the complete list of Distinguished Service Medal Recipients.

Just two years after the birth of The American Legion, its founders saw fit to award a Distinguished Service Medal as tribute to those who made great contributions to veterans. The first award, presented in 1921 at the Legion's national convention, could not be limited to one individual. Instead, five were presented to recognize the importance of Allied forces in the victorious battles of World War I. United in Kansas City, Mo., the chosen site for the National World War I Museum at the Liberty Memorial, Legionnaires resolved: "... in recognition of the respect, admiration and affection which The American Legion has for the distinguished guests now honoring us, and as a mark of our esteem and gratification at the honor thus paid Chester Nimitz & General Dwight us by attending our National Convention, The American Legion, in

convention assembled, hereby authorizes Marshal Ferdinand Foch (of France), Admiral Sir David Beatty (of Great Britain), Lieutenant General Baron Jacques (of Belgium), General Armando Diaz (of Italy) and M. Charles Bertrand (of France, president of the Inter-Allied Veterans Association) to wear the official badge of The American Legion.

It is the most prestigious award given by The American Legion. The medal is typically presented at The American Legion's National Convention. Past recipients include prominent figures like U.S. Presidents, military leaders, and organizations. The awardees are listed by decades, and the list is impressive to say the least. 1945 Admiral history and check out the records, D. Eisenhower; 1946 J. Edgar Hoover; 1949 President Harry S. Tru-

man, the first President from Legionnaire ranks; 1958 Unknown Servicemen of WWI, WWII and Korea who live only in the memories of the comrades and families with no known resting place; 1975 Harry W. Colmery Considered the principal architect of the GI Bill, Colmery was the first past national commander to earn the Legion's Distinguished Service Medal in 1975. "No one deserves it more," National Commander James M. Wagonseller said. "All veterans of World War II owe him a debt of gratitude."; 2003 Dr. Jane Stellman & Steven Stellman recognized for their work linking illnesses of Vietnam War veterans to the herbicide and defoliant sprayed by the US Military in country (Agent Orange); 2021 Vietnam War combat nurse, Vietnam Women's Memorial Foundation and Legionnaire Diane Carlson Evans received at National Convention in Phoenix for decades of Veteran advocacy.





Sheffield American Legion Riders aim to forge a path in the Berkshires

Sheffield — A random stop at a Walmart store led Lee residents Neal and Cindy Raymond to combine their love for motorcycles with their military service to steer the couple down a philanthropic path.

The retired veterans are now spending their days developing the Sheffield Legion Riders #340, the first American Legion Riders chapter

in the southern portion of Berkshire County. The motorcycle group serves within The American Legion, "focusing on patriotism, charity, community, and country, with a strong emphasis on supporting veterans and their families and the community," Neal Raymond said.

The American Legion is a veterans' organization that aids veterans as well as the community, with the Riders constituting a program within that organization. The American Legion is comprised of Legionnaires, or the veterans; offspring of the veterans; and the Auxiliary that, historically, included the women who were related to veterans. The Riders is the fourth component of the American Legion.

"This is our first year, so we are in an active recruiting phase," Neal Raymond said of the Sheffield Legion Riders. Anyone who is a veteran, son or daughter of a veteran, or related to a veteran, such as a grandchild, niece, or nephew, can

become a member of the Riders.


The 11 American Legion posts in Berkshire County are housed within the organization's District 1: #68 Pittsfield, #125 North Adams, #152 Williamstown, #155 Dalton, #160 Adams, #254 West Stockbridge, #298 Housatonic, #340 Sheffield, #350 New Marlborough, #446 Lanesborough, and #456 Sandisfield. Only the Dalton and North Adams chapters currently include Riders groups, with Sheffield and its 10 members counting as the third such division in the area.

The Raymonds started the process to create the Sheffield group in January when they received a message from one of the South County post officials asking for a local Riders chapter. They have been members of the Dalton Legion Riders for 14 years.

"Cindy and I took a look at the Legions and felt that the Sheffield [American] Legion was probably the most appropriate one given the fact that it literally sits on Route 7 and you can't get much more south in South County than Sheffield," Neal Raymond said.

.**WASHINGTON** — The Department of Veterans Affairs announced today it has processed more disability benefits compensation & pension ratings claims in a single year than ever before.

In fiscal year 2024, VA processed a total of 2,517,519 ratings claims, and this year the department reached an all-time high of 2,524,115 ratings claims issued Aug. 8 — nearly two months before the end of FY25.

The milestone is the latest in a string of noteworthy VA claims processing achievements. Since President Trump was inaugurated Jan. 20, the backlog of Veterans waiting for VA benefits has dropped by more than 37%, after rising 24% during the Biden Administration.

In July, VA completed more than 300,000 ratings claims in a single month for the first time ever. VA is processing claims faster in FY25 than in FY24, completing them 17.8% faster even as receipts are 10% higher than this time last year.

"Under President Trump, VA is making major improvements to better serve Veterans, and this announcement underscores that fact," said VA Secretary Doug Collins. "We look forward to implementing more reforms to increase customer service and convenience for those we are charged with serving."

Other highlights of VA's accomplishments during the second Trump Administration include:

VA has opened <u>16 new health care clinics around</u> the country.

- Since Jan. 20, VA has offered Veterans nearly 1 million appointments outside of normal operating hours.
- These early-morning, evening, and weekend

appointments are giving Veterans more timely and convenient options for care.

VA is spending <u>an additional \$800 million</u> on infrastructure improvements to ensure VA facilities provide safe and effective patient care.

VA has made it <u>easier</u> and <u>faster</u> for VA-enrolled Veterans to access care from non-VA providers at the department's expense.

VA has implemented <u>major reforms</u> to make it easier for survivors to get benefits, after <u>serious problems</u> during the Biden Administration.

VA is <u>accelerating the deployment</u> of its integrated electronic health record system, after the program was nearly dormant for almost two years under the Biden Administration.

VA partnered with the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to identify and recover \$106 million in duplicate billing.

VA is <u>phasing out treatment for gender dysphoria</u>. Frankly, this commonsense reform should have been done years ago, but only President Trump and Secretary Collins had the courage to do it.

VA <u>ended DEI at the department</u>, reversing the divisive Biden-era policies and stopping more than \$14 million in DEI spending.

VA has brought tens of thousands of VA employees <u>back to the office</u>, where VA can work better as a team to serve Veterans.

VA encourages all Veterans to visit <u>VA.gov</u> to learn more and apply for the care and benefits they have earned.

Vietnam Veteran Ron Cabral, 81, Graduates from Bristol Community College: A Testament to Lifelong Learning and Veteran Resilience

In a moment that inspired an entire community, 81-year-old Vietnam Veteran and Purple Heart recipient Ron Cabral walked across the stage at Bristol Community College's 58th Commencement Ceremony on May 17, 2025, earning his Associate in Arts in General Studies [1]. His achievement is more than personal—it's a powerful testament to the enduring spirit of Vietnam Veterans and the transformative power of education at any age.

Ron's journey back to the classroom after more than five decades exemplifies the courage and determination that defined his military service. His graduation was not just a milestone—it was a celebration of perseverance, purpose, and the belief that it's never too late to pursue your dreams.

His success was made possible in part by the **MassEducate** program, a groundbreaking initiative in Massachusetts that provides free tuition and fees for all eligible community college students, regardless of age or income [2]. Adult learners over 25 who have not earned a bachelor's degree can now attend any of the state's 15 public community colleges tuition-free, with additional allowances for books and supplies. Ron's story also highlights the vital role of veteran support networks. His accomplishment was supported by a strong partnership between **Bristol's Student Veterans of America (SVA) chapter**, **American Legion Post 303**, and **VFW Post 2045** in Swansea, MA. The SVA chapter at Bristol, led by nationally recognized advisor Dennis Cosmo, fosters a vibrant community of military-connected students and alumni, promoting academic success, leadership, and camaraderie [3].

Research shows that elder veterans returning to campus are more engaged, which enhances neural plasticity and contributes to a better quality of life. Ron's achievement is a shining example of this phenomenon—his intellectual curiosity and commitment to growth have not only enriched his own life but also inspired others.

As Ron crossed the stage to receive his degree, he carried with him the legacy of Vietnam Veterans and the promise of lifelong learning. His story reminds us that education is not bound by age, and that veterans continue to serve their communities in powerful ways long after their military service ends.


